Forensics and Histology – A waste of time?

It was a change of location for the last scientific meeting. Fellow histologists gathered at the Plueckhahn lecture theatre at the Victorian Institute of Forensic Medicine (VIFM) to hear Dr. Noel Woodford discuss the importance of histological investigation in Forensics.

At VIFM the preliminary examination process begins with a CT scan of all the bodies that arrive for investigation. This has proved to be extremely beneficial in identifying pathological processes that may or may not be relevant to what is being investigated, incidental findings, and furthermore may avoid the necessity for autopsy and subsequent histological examination.

The histological examination can assist in the diagnosis of injury (bruises and gunshot wounds), confirmation and or refining of macroscopic findings, including incidental pathologies identified at autopsy (tumours) as well as diseases associated with ageing. It ultimately provides a permanent record of pathologies identified. At VIFM a minimum of 22 blocks are routinely taken for histological examination.

The age of the bruise can be of particular importance in medico-legal cases. Examination of gunshot wounds can identify the distance of range of the gunshot, contact wounds as well as the entrance and exit of bullets.

Dr Woodford explained that whilst diagnosing cancer/ tumour in a deceased patient, it is of upmost importance to determine the type of cancer, as this may result in implications for existing family members, who may require genetic testing. Dr Woodford mentioned that incidental findings such as tumour diagnosis can be very difficult for some family members who do not wish to undergo genetic testing, let alone knowing that they may be at risk.

Throughout the presentation, Dr Woodford showed various macroscopic and microscopic images of tumours, eg: nodules in the liver seen in hepatocellular carcinoma, infections such as tuberculosis and meningitides, causes of natural disease such as myocardial infarction as well as some unusual natural death cases including a case of a 20 year old male who died unexpectedly at a football game. At autopsy it was discovered this young man had a heart weighing 600grams (hypertrophic myocytes).

In conclusion, Dr Woodford was very convincing that histological examination of forensic tissue blocks are definitely not a waste of time and ultimately provide a permanent record of pathology identified at autopsy.

This interesting presentation concluded with a tour of the histology laboratory at VIFM lead by Mr David Cauci.

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FINANCIAL STATEMENTS 2009-2010

As demonstrated by the financial statements the HGV has had a successful year. We made a surplus of \$8558.34 which was mainly due to \$5000 being returned to us from the South Australian Histology group. This money was initially added to money from the NSW Histology group as part of a fund to assist states organising National meetings. The money has been used by both the Queensland and SA Histology groups. Once the conference had concluded, it is then passed to the next state. As all 4 states with Histology groups have had the opportunity to host the National meeting, all are now in a financial position not to require the fund any longer, so all moneys have been returned to the originating states. The other significant venture the HGV undertook during the year was the One Day Seminar in March. Whilst we budgeted to break even, our registration numbers were higher than anticipated, thus making a small profit.

Our overall assets have risen to \$36804.42. This amount enables us to comfortably organise scientific and social events with adequate cash flow. We maintain the principle of offering membership at no cost and continue to offer conference registrations lower than any other pathology discipline, which is a credit to the voluntary work done by the committee.
