Article Review

A study to determine the incidence of estrogen receptor (ER) and progesterone receptor (PR) expression in different histological grades of breast cancer.

All patients diagnosed with Breast cancer in the Department of Pathology, Silchar Medical College and Hospital from October 2010 to September 2011 were reviewed. A total of 50 mastectomies or partial resection specimens with or without axillary lymph node involvement were included in the study. Patient demographic profiles, side of breast involved and the involvement of lymph nodes were obtained.

All specimens were fixed in 10% buffered formalin immediately after the operation. The tissues were sectioned according to the standard guidelines and processed under standard conditions in an automated tissue processor.

Tumour sections were stained with ER, PR and a negative control. Interpretation of the IHC was performed according to the American Society of Clinical Oncology/College of American Pathologists guideline recommendations. ER and PR were considered positive if at least 1% of the tumour nuclei showed the presence of staining.

The median and mean age of patients was 50 years. The left breast was more commonly involved (56%) and the tumour size ranged from 0.5 to 11cm. All cases were diagnosed as infiltrating ductal carcinoma. 20% were grade 1, 48% grade 2 and 32% grade 3. ER and PR were positive in 44% and 48% of cases respectively. 60% of cases were free from lymph node metastasis. Of the 40% of cases with lymph node involvement, eight cases had up to 3 nodes involved and 12 cases had more than 3 nodes involved. 34% of cases were form premenopausal women.

ER positivity;

- Grade 1 70%
- Grade 2 42%
- Grade 3 25%

PR positivity;

- Grade 1 80%
- Grade 2 50%
- Grade 3 25%

The incidence of ER and PR positivity in this study is lower compared to western studies but comparable to studies done in India and other developing countries. The lower incidence of ER and PR may be due to the increased number of high grade tumours, tumours presenting in premenopausal women and variations in laboratory technique and evaluation.


